Chrismons

• Explanation

Chrismons were first made by Francis Kipp Spencer at the Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia. She also invented the word, Chrismon, which is a combination of hrist and monogram (meaning symbol). The idea quickly spread to other churches. Traditionally Christian groups make their own Chrismons using their favorite Christian symbols. Many churches have a Christmas tree in the sanctuary that is totally decorated with Chrismons.

Chrismons are traditionally colored white and gold. White is the liturgical color for the Christmas Season. Gold symbolizes the majesty and glory of Jesus.

- v Poster board or card stock
- U Ribbons, glitter, beads, sequins, etc.
- **U** Glue
- **U** Scissors
